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## COMPANION PLANTING: Quick Rules

Adapted from "Carrots Love Tomatoes" by Louise Riotte, Versa Press, 1998

### *Do Plant:*

- \*Asparagus with Tomatoes
- \*Beans with carrots or summer savory
- \*Beets with onions or kohlrabi
- \*Cabbage family with aromatic herbs, beans, celery, potatoes
- \*Cucumbers with corn
- \*Leeks with onions, celery and carrots
- \*Lettuce with radish
- \*Tomatoes with parsley or garlic
- \*Turnips with peas

### *Don't Plant:*

- \*Beans with onions, garlic or gladiolus
- \*Beets with pole beans
- \*Cabbage family with strawberries, tomatoes, pole beans
- \*Potatoes with pumpkins, squash, cucumbers, sunflowers, tomatoes or raspberries
- \*Tomatoes with kohlrabi

### *Tips:*

- \*Rotate Broccoli and Cabbage every 2 years
- \*Leave tomatoes in the same place UNLESS they get a disease; then move them to a different part of the garden
- \*Do not plant tomatoes or potatoes in a bed formerly used by the other
- \*Plant horseradish on end of rows or corners of potato patch. Dig out thoroughly at end of season to prevent aggressive spread.
- \*Follow heavy feeders, such as corn, with legumes, which will replace the nitrogen lost from the soil
- \*Don't rotate cucubrits (cucumbers and relatives) to other sites in the garden that had cucubrits
- \*Cucumbers, melons, squash and pumpkins interplanted with corn can deter raccoons, who don't like to walk on the vines
- \*Intermingling onions with companion plants prevents the onion maggot from going row to row
